A Message From Our Leadership

Miami has always been drawn to the new and the bold. As a young city, still defining its story, we continue to shape our identity, build the values that unite us and set a course for our future – one that becomes clearer when viewed through the lens of history.

This past fiscal year brought significant challenges that tested our resilience, including facility maintenance issues that required us to close at least one of our buildings for nearly half the year. Yet despite these setbacks, we remained steadfast in our mission of sharing Miami's stories – both past and present – and still welcomed nearly 27,000 visitors to the museum. In fact, the success of *Mythic Creatures: Dragons, Unicorns & Mermaids*, which opened the year prior but ran through the first six months of the fiscal year we're highlighting in this report, helped bring our admission numbers back to prepandemic levels, reinforcing the community's deep engagement with our work.

We also proudly presented the first exhibition supported by our Photography Fellowship program with *Sanctuary: Our Sacred Place*, a compelling series of images by Miami-based photographer Woosler Delisfort. His work beautifully captures the spiritual origins of Miami's Indigenous, African and Caribbean communities, documenting sacred spaces that serve as sources of empowerment. As part of this initiative, a selection of Delisfort's work has been added to our permanent collection, preserving these arresting images for future museumgoers.




EXHIBITIONS & COLLECTIONS

Miami's stories are your stories

In addition to five core exhibitions, we present temporary showings that reflect community interests and take an even deeper dive into the pages of our shared history book.

Sanctuary: Our Sacred Place presented the work of Little Haiti-based photographer Woosler Delisfort, our inaugural photography fellow. These 100-plus powerful images captured moments of divine connection in temples, churches and mosques. An online exhibition of the work rendered by our Youth Photography Fellowship cohort was shown in tandem. **Mythic Creatures: Dragons, Unicorns & Mermaids** – presented alongside the local lore-focused **Mythic Miami** – explored how different cultures across the globe imagine otherworldly beings.





Our Community Gallery hosted Arts4All's Mystic Creatures & Art Therapy, which showcased the creative works of local K-8 students; 100 Years of Jai-Alai in Miami; Miami Magnet Schools Through the Years; and Gwendolyn S. Cherry: Seven Years on the Hill, a collaboration with Rep. Ashley Gantt and The Black Archives. And a partnership with Washington Avenue BID allowed us to present a special off-site exhibition that explored how Muhammad Ali's title fight against Sonny Liston – and the time he spent in Miami training for the historic bout – impacted the rest of his life.

We also added 570 objects to our permanent collections – including a 1964 WQAM interview with The Beatles promoting their Miami Beach concert, an Anita Bryant protest tote and a portable organ from The Church of God Tabernacle – and served 1,210 patrons in person and online through our Research Center.

PROGRAMS & EVENTS

A kaleidoscope of Miami's cultural history

The South Florida Folklife Center brings history to life through our annual, much-anticipated **CultureFest 305** folklife festival; the longtime **Heritage Spotlight Artist-in-Residence Series**, which this fiscal year featured Korean martial arts master Sangwon Jeong and dance ensemble Ballet Folklórico Aires Panameños; and our uniquely interactive **Cultural Encounters** adventures.

A Black History Month collaboration with influencer Keymia Sharpe that shared stories of Miami's Black neighborhoods, reaching more than **250,000** people.


Reaching **180,000** people on social media – the year's highest-performing post! – by sharing the haunted history of the iconic Biltmore Hotel.


